#### What is a Maule?

The Maule is a single-engine light aircraft, 500 made in the USA, since the mid – 1980s. This one is a 1994 model, 2 seats in front row, 3 in the rear. 4 fuel tanks, 235HP Lycoming engine, 2 blade constant propeller, cruise at 128 knots.



display of low runs over the gravel runway at 50', steep turns and reciprocal runs while opening a small water valve. Very entertaining, that's for sure.
